CHOOSING THE IOL THAT FITS YOUR LIFESTYLE

Monofocal Lens

Typically covered by insurance or Medicare, these trusted lenses provide clear distance vision. However, you will likely still need glasses for reading - and possibly for distance vision, particulary if you already have a pre-existing astigmatism.

PRO'S:

- Improved distance vision
- Cost usually covered by insurance and Medicare

CON'S:

• Will likely still require glasses for close-up vision

Astigmatism-Correcting

Toric Lens

These advanced technology lenses are designed to correct astigmatism at the time of surgery for clear distance vision, usually without the need for glasses. However, you will still need glasses for reading.

Multifocal Lens

You now have several choices of multifocal lenses. In addition to correcting distance vision, the doctor can select from multifocal IOLs that can improve near and/or intermediate vision. We custom-tailor the options to meet the needs of your lifestyle.

PRO'S:

 Improved distance vision, usually without glasses, for astigmatic patients

CON'S:

• Will likely still require glasses for close-up vision

PRO'S:

• True performance at all distances, near and distance

CON'S:

 May experience glare/halos around lights at night and difficulty seeing in low lighting situations, like driving at night

PREPARING FOR YOUR SURGERY

The Night Before Your Surgery

- Use eye drops as directed
- **DO NOT** eat or drink anything after midnight the day before your surgery unless otherwise directed, or your surgery will be canceled.

The Morning of Your Surgery

- Use eye drops as directed
- Take morning medications (only if instructed) with a small glass of water

Pre-Surgery Checklist

- Wear comfortable, loose-fitting clothes
- DO NOT wear jewelry, nail polish, or makeup
- DO NOT bring money or valuables with you
- Bring a list of medications you are taking
- Bring your eye drops
- Have your ID and insurance cards with you
- Make sure an adult driver is available to take you home following surgery and will be available for the next 24 hours if needed

Surgery Eyedrops

Eye drops will be sent to your pharmacy one week prior to surgery. You are to start the drops 3 days before surgery, including the morning of surgery.

Please wait 2-5 minutes between each drop. See medication instruction sheet for directions.

Please bring ALL of your eye drops with you to EVERY appointment.

WHAT TO EXPECT

During Your Surgery

- Most cataract surgeries are performed under topical or local anesthesia and numbing eye drops.
- Although you may feel slight pressure during surgery, you should not experience any discomfort.
- If you feel any pain or nausea during surgery please let the physician or nurse know so they can make you more comfortable.
- The surgery lasts less than 30 minutes. You will be given an anesthetic to numb the nerves in and around your eye. You will likely see light and motion during surgery, but should not experience any pain.
- Following surgery, you will spend a short period of time in the recovery area.

After Your Surgery

- You will be required to use eye drops for a minimum of four weeks after surgery. These drops are used to prevent infection and inflammation during the healing process.
- You will be seen the next day at Family Eye Physicians.
- You may take ibuprofen to relieve any discomfort.
- Your vision may be slightly blurred for up to a week after surgery.
- You may have some redness in the eye but it should clear up in a few days.
- You may also notice a difference in your pupil size. This is not uncommon and will return to it's normal size within a few days.

Post Surgery Instructions

- Tape the eye shield over the operated eye when you sleep until further instructed. Wear sunglasses provided in kit at all times (except while sleeping).
- No rubbing the eye.
- No showering/washing hair or face until the fifth day after surgery.
- Bathe from the neck down only.
- No heavy lifting (over 10 lbs), and no bending over for 1 week.
- No driving until doctor release.

If you experience any of the following symptoms after surgery:

- Extreme redness and/or pain
- Sudden burst of light followed by vision loss

- Increased discharge
- Flashes of light or floaters
